

How to remove very strong adhesive left by a sticker

Possible solutions for very strong adhesive residue

 - Scrub gently with a toothbrush and soap.
 - Use an adhesive remover spray such as GooGone.

 - Rinse with water and dry.
 - Pour a pot of boiling water onto the adhesive and wait five minutes. Gently remove the sticker with a pair of tongs.
 - Apply a coat of clear nail polish over the sticker and wait a few minutes. Peel off the polish.
 - Peel the sticker off slowly using a vegetable peeler.
 - Scrape off the sticker with a spatula.



Warning: Very Strong Adhesive Removal May Be Hazardous

If you have a sticker that's stuck on something really well, there's not much you can do but wait and hope it will eventually come off on its own. However, if the adhesive is especially strong, there are a few things you can try and remove it safely.

The most important thing is to avoid getting any of the adhesives on your skin. If you do, use rubbing alcohol or acetone on a cloth and wipe it off. These chemicals will break down the adhesive and make it easier to remove.

If the adhesive is just sticking to one side of the sticker, you can try using a credit card or a plastic card like a screwdriver to gently pull it off. If the adhesive is more widespread, you may need to use a utility knife or a blade to cut it off. Just be sure to wear gloves and avoid getting any of the adhesives on your skin.
